The goal of the project is to grow the number of beginning farmers on the island and provide tools to enhance their successes and financial viability. The majority of these farmers will be "socially disadvantaged." There are numerous Molokai families that have a history of farming, but who have lost that familial knowledge. There is currently a movement on the island to learn (or re-learn) these skills that are critical for our sustainability and survival in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. Sustainable Molokai aims to address this need by collaborating with community partners to offer 5 different agricultural education and training programs that foster the development of these socially disadvantaged beginning farmers: (1) University of Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (UHCTAHR) Garden to Farm classes, (2) Agricultural internships, (3) Egg Production Workshops, (4) GoFarm Hawaii AgBusiness Workshops, and (5) USDA program coordination.
